Editorial: Good Idea/ Bad Idea:

Are ‘C’s Acceptable?–

Over the last 15 years a lot has changed in our schools. Some have been good, some have been bad and some changes have just been different. For example our marking system. By now, some of you have worked out what it means if your child gets a Level 1, 2, 3 or 4. For those of you who don't, here is a brief explanation.

Level 1 (D)- your child is struggling to understand the work material and struggles to meet academic expectations.

Level 2 (C) - your child is slightly below the Ontario expectations for the assignment. They did not provide enough detail or display enough knowledge to prove that they understand the assignment and/or the work material.

Level 3(B)- your child is doing exactly what is expected of a child in their grade. They understand the material being taught and have met expectations for given assignments.

Level 4 (A)- your child has gone above and beyond their grade expectations. They understand all materials being taught and have demonstrated their understanding through extensive detail on homework assignments, tests and projects.

Now that you are aware how your child is graded do you feel that C's (level 2) are acceptable? Here lies what I call a “gray area”. When a “C” appears on a report card I assess the school year to date.

Is there a lack of understanding? Is this the best the child can do? Has the teacher ‘pegged’ the child as a ‘C’ student or is the child not applying themselves? If it is lack of understanding then C's aren't acceptable, but are a good indication as to what needs to be worked on. However if your child worked hard to achieve that C then I feel a congratulations for that grade is necessary. If the teacher has unnecessarily ‘pegged’ a child as a ‘C’ student then that grade is beyond their control. Lastly if the ‘C’ on the report card is purely a result of the child being unmotivated and not trying then a C is most definitely unacceptable.

What’s Cooking

Oven Baked Carrot Fries

Ingredients:

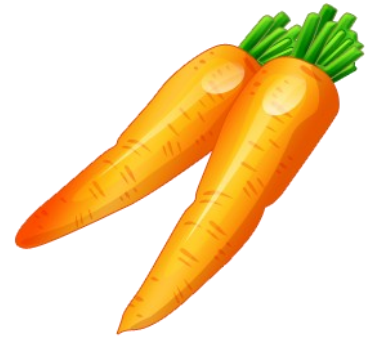
1 1/2 lbs. carrots
1 tsp. sugar
2 tbsp. olive oil
1/2 tsp. salt
2 tbsp. finely chopped pinch of pepper
fresh rosemary

Directions

Preheat oven to 425. Line a shallow pan with foil. Using a sharp knife, slice away the tip and end of each carrot; peel each completely. Cut carrots in half cross-wise, then cut length-wise, then cut length-wise again.

In a mixing bowl, combine the carrot sticks, oil, rosemary, salt and pepper. Stir till all are evenly coated. Place carrots in pan, spreading sticks out as much as possible. Bake for 20 minutes or until carrots are tender. Serve hot or at room temperature.

Makes 4 servings
